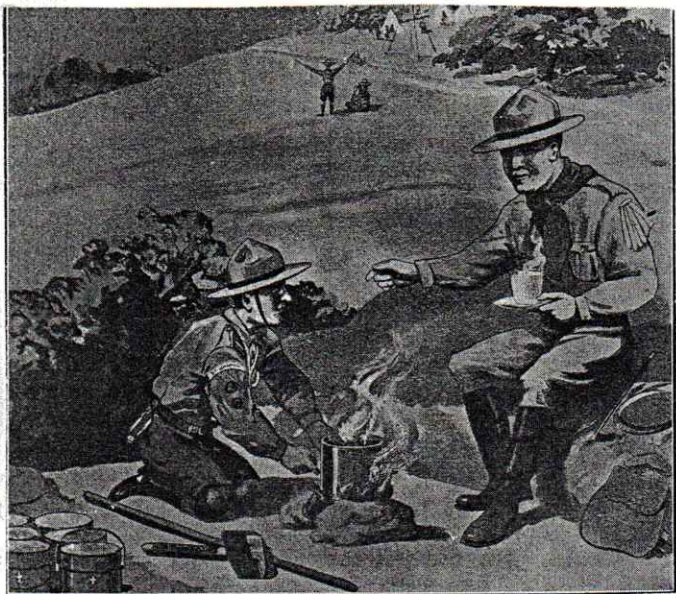
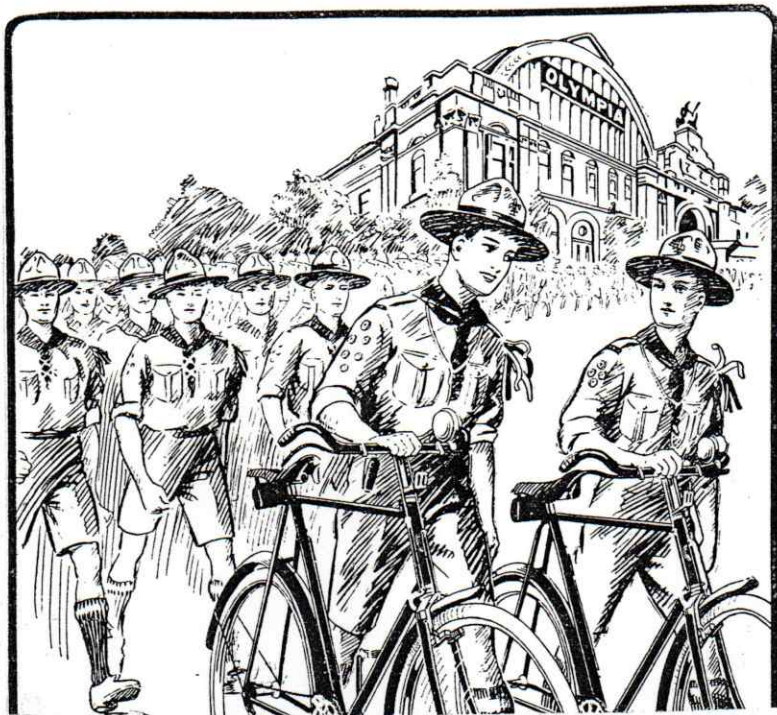

The huge gallery all round the building under the Arena Seats was alive & packed with Scouts of many Nations, each country showing what it could do with side show, demonstration, & making of different handcrafts.



In the Annex we saw these different Scouts at work making things. There was also a Model Colliery run by Northumberland Scouts with their pit ponies.

A sand tracking ground too, offered opportunities for deducting stories from foot prints, matches & other signs.

the wonderful Scouting we saw.

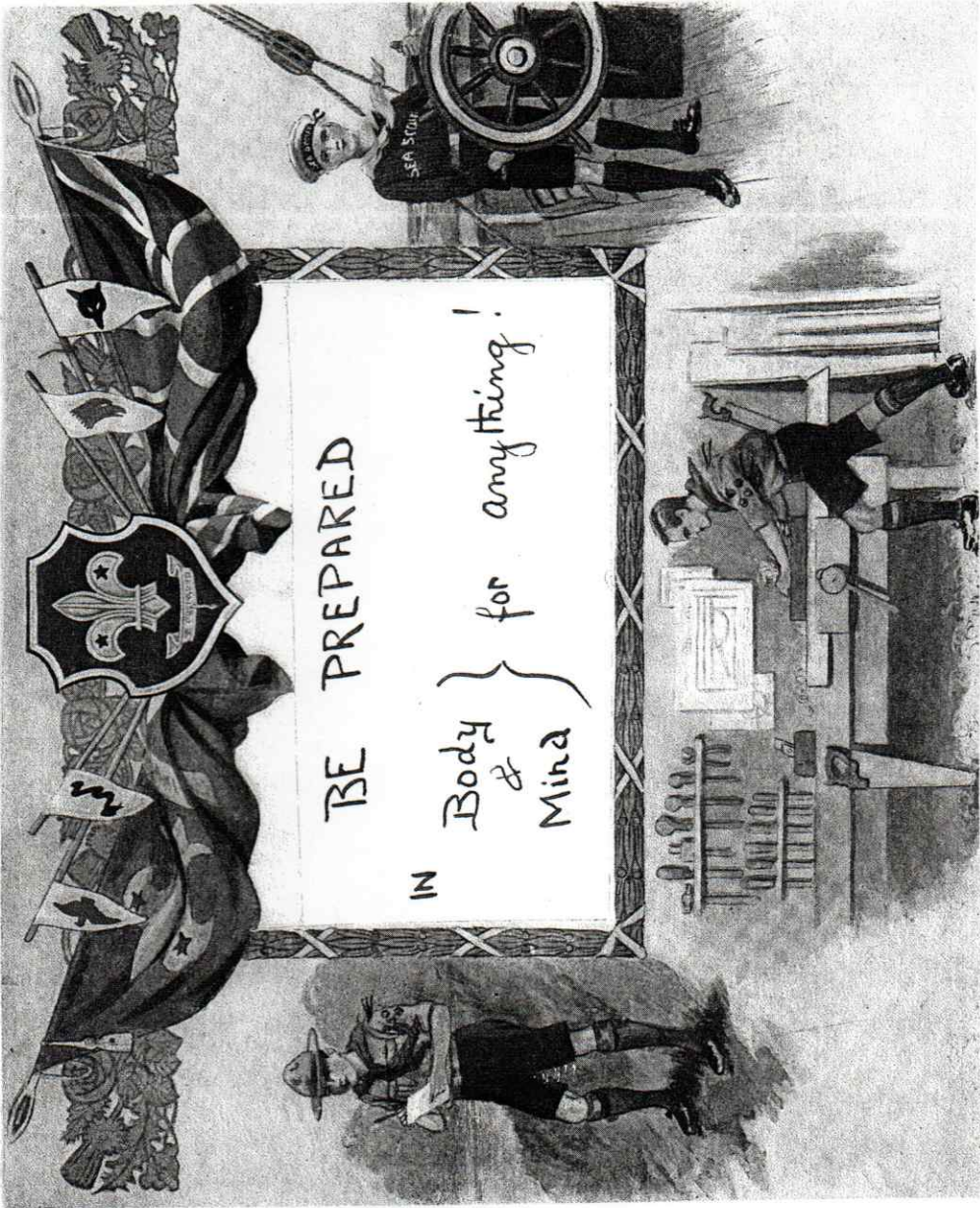
The seats around the Arena were

felt we could hold no more.

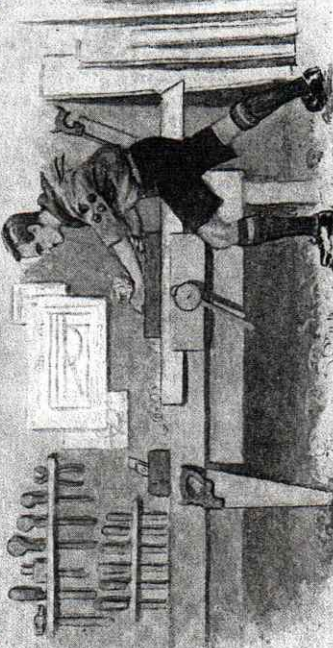
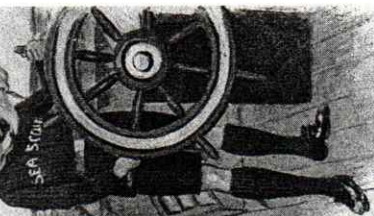

## AIMS AND OBJECTS

The Aims and Objects of the International Jamboree are:—

1. To make our ideals and methods more widely known abroad.
2. To extend the benefits of our Organisation to the boys in the densely populated industrial centres, where moral and physical training is very badly needed.
3. To inculcate in a practical way the fundamentals of good and happy citizenship.
4. To consolidate the British Commonwealth of Oversea States through closer personal touch with us and each other, thereby ensuring the continuance of the comradeship of the battlefield.
5. To promote the spirit of brotherhood among the rising generation throughout the world, thereby giving the spirit that is necessary to make the League of Nations a living force.
6. To teach and encourage kindness to animals and birds.
7. To stimulate energy among the Scout Troops.
8. To make our aims and methods better understood by administrators, educationists, parents, clergy, and the public.
9. To recruit Scoutmasters and workers.
10. To complete our Endowment Fund, so that the Movement will be placed on a permanent and sound financial basis for wider development.

The support and help of the public, Commissioners and Scoutmasters to make this great Jamboree a really outstanding success and a landmark in international history is cordially asked for.
